Councilmember Shaw moved to approve payment of invoices as presented. Motion seconded by Councilmember Armstrong and carried unanimously.

Mr. Tommy Greene, Comptroller was recognized and discussed the benefits of upgrading gas meters to electronic read meters.

Councilmember Teeter made motion to authorize Superintendent Davis to send out bids to purchase electronic read meters as recommended by Comptroller. Motion seconded by Councilmember Lauderdale and carried.

Mayor Davis reported there are two bridges in the city limits that the city is responsible for all repairs and they are up for inspection. He presented quote for \$1,350.00 to repair both bridges.

Councilmember Shaw moved to approve quote of \$1,350.00 to repair both bridges. Motion seconded by Councilmember Hawthorne and carried.

Mayor Davis stated that Mary Amburgey term has expired on the Library Board and he stated that Billy Courington will serve a term on the Library Board.

Councilmember Lauderdale moved to appoint Billy Courington to serve on the Library Board. Motion seconded by Councilmember Teeter and carried.

Mayor Davis stated the annual liability insurance is up for renewal and he need approval to accept quote from Best Insurance Company.

Councilmember Teeter moved to accept quote from Best Insurance Company to renew liability insurance for 2019-2020. Motion seconded by Councilmember Armstrong and carried.

Mrs. Leslie Klasing, City Attorney stated that the Bingo Ordinance is in compliance with the laws stated in Jefferson County. City Attorney made recommendation to contact the Jefferson County Sheriff and the District Attorney to investigate the businesses and if there is illegal activity they should shut them down. Mrs. Klasing also stated there is an Ordinance prepared for the Council to consider a moratorium on allowing no more than four bingo businesses within the city. Councilmember Teeter moved to authorize Mayor Davis to contact the Jefferson County Sheriff's and the District Attorney's office and have them to investigate the bingo establishments. Motion seconded by Councilmember Lauderdale and carried.

Ordinance Number 393 was presented as follows:

## ORDINANCE NO. <u>939</u>

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Graysville passed Ordinance No. 936 on February 7, 2019 regarding the licensing and regulation of Bingo games in the City of Graysville; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the governing body of the City of Graysville to set policies and enact regulations which improve the quality of life for everyone who lives, works or does business in the City and to attract new residents and new and diverse businesses and industry to become a part of the community; and

WHEREAS, there has been a strong response to Ordinance No. 936, with at least four (4) entities having applied for and received a permit to operate a bingo establishment since the passage of Ordinance No. 936; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Graysville finds that the over-development of bingo establishments within the Graysville City limits would be detrimental to the City's development and effectively limit the ability of the City to attract diverse types of business; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the overall economic development to provide for orderly growth and balance the development of these businesses in order to have a diverse and stable economy; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that it is in the best interest of the City of Graysville that the issue of concentration or saturation of bingo establishments be analyzed for the purpose of determining the best possible approach for such regulation; and

WHEREAS, a period of repose is necessary in order to establish regulations made with reasonable consideration of, among other things, the character of the City and its particular suitability for particular uses, and with a view to conserving the value of land usage and encouraging the most appropriate use of land throughout the City; and

WHEREAS, a temporary moratorium on the issuance of permits and other approvals for such bingo establishments will create a stable environment so that revisions to the City's ordinances can be considered and adopted in an orderly and thorough process; and

WHEREAS, the proposed moratorium will allow the City of Graysville to protect its communities from blight while preserving the status quo; thereby allowing the City the opportunity to perform a comprehensive analysis to determine the appropriate means to prevent the over-saturation of those bingo establishments.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Graysville that there is hereby declared a moratorium on the issuance of permits or other approvals under Ordinance No. 936. During the period of the moratorium, applications, other than for renewal of permits for the aforementioned establishments, shall not be accepted and no new permits for such establishments shall be issued.

This moratorium is not intended to impact those establishments currently permitted or operating within the City of Graysville, unless such establishments cease operation and thereafter seek a new or renewed business license.

This Ordinance shall become immediately effective upon its adoption and approval of the City Council and publication by posting as required by law.
